- Coalition of partners serving youth in Greater Nashua is recruiting hundreds of volunteer adults who can mentor, tutor, and support young people who are needing assistance in distance learning.
- Also a school supply pantry is in place at UW.
- UW has purchased 100 hotspots for internet access for young people who do not have access at home
- Seeking locations where mentoring/tutoring can take place, need wifi connection.

• Meg Hamm: suggests Mike reach out to Masonic Lodge to see if they are interested in participating in this program.

Doug Howard — housing/rent/utilities assistance

- Recently took position at Front Door formerly held by Kristy Besada
- Provide services for people living in several Hillsborough County towns
- Loans for rent deposits
- Pay off debts to enable families to stay current on rent payments
- Rapid rehousing for homeless families, providing up to one year of rental assistance
- Coordinates with other service organizations and government welfare offices to help families with needs

- Training sessions were offered to help congregations utilize Zoom
- weekly support group for clergy
