Cultural Connections Committee: Nonny Egbuonu. Committee is growing with the purpose of reaching out to immigrants who are still finding their way in the community. Committee hopes to make Nashua more welcoming to all who come. Upcoming Multicultural Festival will be on Sept 17th at Greeley Park.

Housing Justice: Kristy Besada. Worked with city officials toward passage and funding of an Affordable Housing Trust fund for Nashua, in addition to passage of an Inclusionary Zoning ordinance, which requires a portion of all housing developed in Nashua to include housing for folks below the median income. In addition, we have built relationships with state and local officials to learn more about what permanent solutions can increase housing inventory that is

affordable to folks living below the median income. At times, this work was done in direct cooperation with Granite State Organizing Project.

Spirituality Group w/ Emmaus Institute: With the help of Rev. Dr. Sundell and Rev. Dr. Manseau, Nonny and others have trained as pastoral care specialists to continue to help people who need care on Thursday mornings from 9-10. This has continued through the pandemic, but on Zoom. This has helped sustain people, even from outside the area.

## 2021-2022 Treasurer's Report - Meta Vornehm

The NAIC maintains three accounts: the NAIC general account as well as acting as a fiscal sponsor for the Interfaith Choir and the Crop Walk.

## Income:

Our primary source of revenue is Member Dues. We also collected some small cash donations at a hybrid Thanksgiving Service (attendees were encouraged to donate online). Normally we collect donations at The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity service which did not happen this year due to COVID.

### Expenses:

Our largest expense is donations to causes associated with our speakers. We had a number of internal speakers which reduced our costs. We also pay administrative costs: fees (State of NH Annual Report) and supplies and services (post office box, web hosting, etc.).

#### Cash Flow:

The net cash flow (income minus expenses) for 2021-2022 is +\$224.00 for the NAIC general account (no change in the Christian Unity sub-account), -\$66.03 for the Interfaith Choir account, and +\$1529.94 for the Crop Walk account.
